A Piece of Fame

My retirement story is probably similar to many other ARNS members: travel and volunteer. Travel I have done. Since retiring five and half years ago (where does the time go???) I have visited relatives in Ireland three times. My mother was from a family of 15 so I have oodles of relatives on the Emerald Isle! Also I have spent most winters in a small town on the Pacific Coast of Mexico. It is a very friendly little town (1 hour north of Manzanillo) with a great climate and many Canadians who spend the winter there. The majority of the Canadians are from Western Canada which contributes to a very "homey" feeling while escaping the winter wonderland of the North!!



Volunteering is something most NAIT employees are most familiar with. Upon moving to Hamilton I knew I would get involved with various community efforts. First came SERTOMA which is an International organization which is dedicated in SERVICE TO MANKIND, thus the acronym SERTOMA. The focus is on helping people with hearing and speech problems. Of course one of the major fundraising activities was Bingos, of which I worked many! Next was the Hamilton Fringe, a far cry from Edmonton's but you have to start somewhere! My role was House Manager for various plays. Hamilton's Fringe is still in its infancy. Moving from culture to fitness and outdoors activity I became a Trail Captain for a section of the Bruce Trail. The Bruce Trail hugs the Niagara Escarpment and reaches from Niagara Falls to Tobermory, 800 kms in total. I walk my 4km section regularly ensuring the trail is clear of fallen trees and picking up garbage left behind by some of the hikers. Tim Horton coffee cups are the most common garbage item. Hiking in a forest setting is peaceful and relaxing and I am very fortunate it is only five minutes from my house.

My most high profile volunteer activity is being on the Board which oversees the Canadian Football Hall of Fame and Museum which is located in Hamilton. The Board is made up of City of Hamilton appointees and Canadian Football League appointees. When I applied to be a member of the Board I had no idea that when the Grey Cup travels to a function it must be accompanied by a Board member. This is true for the 10 month period the Grey Cup is in The Hall of Fame. The two months that the winning team has the Cup there is no Board member accompanying the Cup. This is when all the great stories about various escapades with the Cup occur!!!! Travel with Cup depends who is available from the eleven Board members. In my three years with the Board I have been fortunate enough to travel to Vancouver, Calgary, Regina, Saskatoon, Toronto and Halifax. In addition there have been many visitations to communities in Southern Ontario.

It is a great honour to travel with the Grey Cup as well as very personally rewarding answering questions and telling stories about the Cup. The Cup is magical; people can't believe they are getting so close to the Grey Cup. Of course they are over the moon when they get their picture taken with the Cup. Some of the trivia I share with football fans is that the Cup is 100 years old. It was donated in 1909 but this year's Grey Cup game in Calgary is only the 97th game because there was a three year period during the First World War where there were no games played. One fact that seems to get a big reaction is that Wayne Gretzky has his name on the Grey Cup. He is the only person to have his name on both the Stanley Cup and the Grey Cup. In 1991 Gretzky and John Candy were minority owners of the Toronto Argonauts, consequently they have their names on the Cup as the Argos won the Grey Cup that year.

So far my travels with the Cup have not included Edmonton. If it ever does you can be sure there will be lots of photo opportunities on campus!!

Working at NAIT was a rich and enjoyable experience and I find retirement to be equally so!! I am thankful for both!!!!

Around the World

Recently, I was selected to participate in a two week volunteer project supported by Rotary International in the Dominican Republic to renovate, refurbish and rebuild four schools in the Puerto Plata and Moca areas.

The project was carried out by 72 grade eleven students from the Oakville, Toronto, Hamilton, Calgary, and Vancouver areas. Over the course of two weeks, these ambitious students scraped, sanded, and repainted four schools on the inside and outside. In addition, they improved the drainage on the school grounds, built playgrounds, baseball diamonds, basketball courts, put new roofs on outdoor banos, poured concrete, spread gravel, built tables, benches, partition walls, hung doors, constructed and painted garbage bins and played extensively with local schoolchildren. The students were supported by 12 wonderful teachers who gave up their spring break to manage the student work crews. Four Rotarians (including myself) were chosen as project site managers who had experience with renovation/building, educators preferably who had worked with young people and who could speak French (un peu) and Spanish (un poquito).


After a four hour trip from Toronto, the group arrived in Puerto Plata and bunked into an all inclusive resort for three days to become acclimatized... little did they know that would be the last hot water until they returned home. The students wore t-shirts outlining their volunteer work and received many cash donations and sports equipment like soccer balls and baseball gloves from Canadians who were vacationing at the resort. Vacationers opened their hearts and wallets to support the volunteer efforts of these students.

In the Puerto Plata area, students spent two days working on a school ground in Munoz, cleaning up a basketball court in downtown Puerto Plata that had been reclaimed from drug gangs, cleared and raked two acres of a field and planted Yucca to provide food for the residents of a Dominican Republic barrio (slum) at Estancia. At the Art Center in Puerto Plata, students picked up garbage and cleaned rooms in the former Ministry of Justice building that had been turned over to the local artists to serve as an art center.

At the local hospital they reclaimed the courtyard that had been a long standing dumping ground for needles, syringes and broken ampoules. The courtyard was raked, gravel spread and walls re-painted and benches installed for patients to use as an outdoor patio.

All attended a Sunday church service at a Haitian bayete (slum) followed by a walkabout through the slum. The church service was complemented by a generator-powered, stereo amplifier of 1000+ watts of rhythmic church music. There is considerable tension between the Dominicans and the Haitians most of whom are illegal immigrants who work cheaply and are perceived as taking jobs from the Dominicans.

Electricity is free, all you have to do is hook up...some danger here though!
Needless to say Occupational Health and Safety inspectors are not around.



Around the World Continued...

We stayed for the next ten days at a Roman Catholic mission (Monte de Oracion) high on the mountainside at San Victor just outside Moca. Hot water was non-existent, water was available most days and electricity was “variable”. Food was served in a large cafeteria hall and the grounds were patrolled by armed guards in the evening.

The students were able to choose which school they wished to work at from Llenas, Los Cercados, Monte de la Jagua and La Hermita. Each project was quite unique and afforded students opportunities to do manual labor, and many pounded nails and used a hand saw for the first time. What they lacked in skill was compensated for by their enthusiasm. Once off the main highway, travel to the work sites was slow, roads were filled with potholes and the bus could average only about 15 km per hour. Travel is much faster by the DR national symbol, a.k.a. motor bike as riders can navigate around water-filled potholes. On a typical day, students arrived on site at 9 am, by 10 am about 10 locals showed up and pitched in and by 11 am another 10-12 showed up to help out.

Several tours were arranged to break up the workdays and accommodate the intermittent rain. The group toured the National museum in Santiago, visited cigar & cigarette factories and free zones that produced cigars and textiles.

Sunday church in Moca’s Cathedral de Corazon was Rotary day and we were all honored at the church service for our volunteer efforts. Corazon cathedral is one of the most beautiful in the DR. Later in the day, the Rotarians attended a Rotary BBQ which was the 25th anniversary of the local Rotary club. Very unlike Camrose Rotarians, Moca Rotarians all pack pistols which is legal in the DR. Needless to say... Dominicans are responsible for their own security and we never heard of many robberies.

Two particular side trips of note were:

- A visit to meet Dede Mirabel. Dede’s three sisters (Minerva, Patria, and Maria Theresa) were murdered by Trujillo on November 25, 1960 about 6 months before Trujillo himself (el Jefe) was assassinated. I would recommend you watch a movie entitled In the Time of the Butterflies (2001 with Salma Hayak); it is the story of the Mirabel sisters nicknamed La Mariposas (butterflies) who were in the resistance movement against Trujillo. Dede did not join the movement and vowed to raise her sister’s children. Dede (below) is a lively 84 year old patron who has converted the original family farm near Salcedo into a botanical garden as a memorial to her sisters, their husbands and her father.
- A meeting with Pablo Uribe, a wealthy chicken farmer, who was so moved by his visit to the dump in Santiago that he liquidated all his assets and built a school and feeds the squatters living near the dump. He now raises funds to house and feed the squatters so they can ultimately return to their villages. There are over 2000 people that scavenge food and materials from the dump. The dump is about 400 feet high and covers about 500 acres and is rat infested and rife with packs of wild dogs. People are dying daily due to falls, collapsing tunnels in the dump, infections, diseases, etc. Many students had a very difficult time dealing with the living conditions in and around the dump with hundreds of street urchins and abject poverty.

The last day was reserved for four dedication ceremonies; one for each school. Each was very moving... the community... local Rotary President, Rotarians, teachers, officials from the Ministry of Education, parents, grandparents ...all showed up in their finest, hugs and kisses all around, tears in their eyes, they said “gracias nos amigos canadiense”.


